OhioLINK Adds Thousands of Scholarly E-Books, Opens E-Book Center

Thousands of new scholarly e-books, published by Springer, are now available to students, faculty and staff at OhioLINK member institutions. These are **recent** (2005-2007), high-quality scientific, technological and medical books.

Students can use these books to do research anytime, anywhere. Faculty can use the books for research or as course materials. Faculty can assign particular readings and link to relevant chapters or sections from course pages or Web sites.

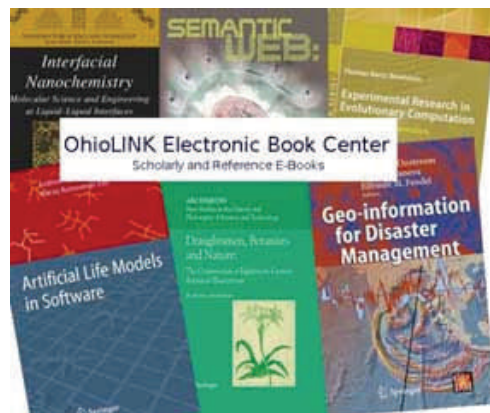
New Springer e-books will be added regularly. These recent additions bring the total number of e-books offered by OhioLINK to 25,000.

These new e-books are available as part of the new Electronic Book Center, <http://ebooks.ohiolink.edu>. Similar in concept to the Electronic Journal Center, <http://journals.ohiolink.edu>, the E-Book Center will allow you to find and utilize e-books from multiple publishers using one common interface.

Currently, the E-Book Center contains 5,000

e-books from Oxford University Press and Springer. Additional e-books and e-book collections will be added, including the Electronic Reference Books collection. Links to OhioLINK's other e-book collections are available from the E-Book Center's home page. Books in the E-Book Center will also be accessible from the OhioLINK Library Catalog, <http://www.ohiolink.edu>.

UC faculty and students have access to over 390,000 e-books in addition to the OhioLINK e-books.

Manufactured goods have been getting cheaper, and with that trend, Bosshart warns, comes cheap morals and cheap ethics.

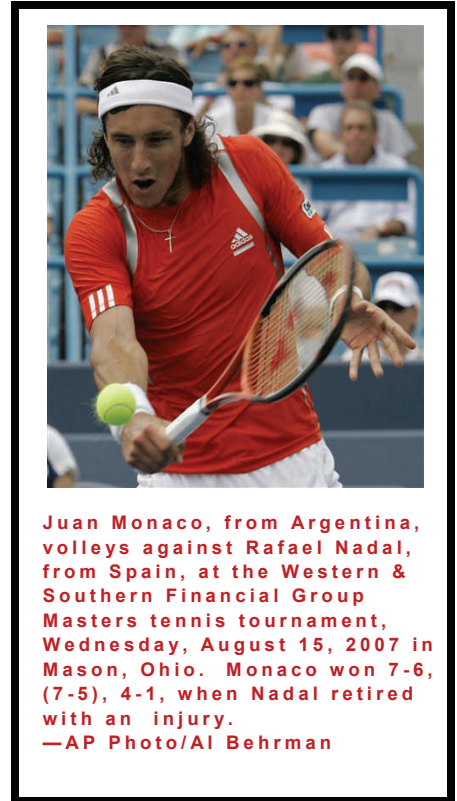

Associated Press Images is a research database of every news event covered by the Associated Press for the last 150 years. AP Images contains over 3.5 million news photographs from the 1840's through today, with more than 3,000 photos being added on a daily basis.

Additionally, users can search through 60,000 graphics, including maps, timelines, logos and graphs.

Subscribers have unlimited access to this unique resource 24/7 from their institution as well as remote locations. All content primary sources are fully captioned and licensed for educational use. Katrina Book Display at Clermont College Library

August 29 marks the second anniversary of Hurricane Katrina's bombardment of Louisiana and the Gulf Coast. The devastation and aftermath of Hurricane Katrina resulted in the production of a fair amount of literature, possibly to provide answers as to how this catastrophe could have happened in our modern world.

The sampling of books in the Library's display case highlight eight books specifically on Katrina, from the vantage point of preparedness (or in this case, the lack of), trust, and loss. Some of the authors and publishers donated all or part of the proceeds of their books to the American Red Cross. Other works include related topics: Disasters, weather, and global warming, which are now explained alternatively as a result of Katrina.

Internet Detective

An excellent tutorial for college students, the Internet Detective (<http://www.vts.intute.ac.uk/detective>) shows students the how (and why) to effectively evaluate web sites for their value as academic resources. Users can progress through the pages in about an hour, or they can choose topics from the cleverly titled table of contents, e.g., What's the Story?, The Good, the Bad, and the Ugly (sites commended and condemned), and Detective Work. Based in England, this site draws some examples from the UK.—*Choice*, v.44, no.4
